The passion that livens up the rescuers, the devotion and desire to carry out rescues are what drives the members of ICAR.


Thank you all for your commitment, for your participation and I wish you a fruitful conference here in Lake Tahoe.





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

We should do everything to assure that mountain rescuers return healthy from their missions, providing the best possible rescue work to casualties.






